



Agroforestry Academy Project Goal and Objectives


Goal

To achieve on-the-ground adoption of agroforestry

Objectives

- Create a regional agroforestry knowledge network
 - Train a core group of individuals who deal with land management issues and/or interact with farmers and landowners.
 - Facilitate collaboration among researchers, extension personnel, and practitioners, diverse disciplines, departments and colleges, and different agencies and organizations.






Agroforestry Academy – Train-the-Trainers Target Audience(s)

- Landowners who are active role models






Agroforestry Academy – Approach


- ✓ Update agroforestry training manual.
- ✓ Monthly teleconference planning meetings w/project team.
- ✓ Annual face-to-face planning and/or post academy evaluation meetings
- Conduct Agroforestry Academy (that's us folks!)
 - Organize and conduct week long "Train-the-trainer" Agroforestry Academy, 2013 and 2014.
 - Classroom presentations, field visits to practitioners' farms, and a "hands-on landowner case study" exercise, with field visits, in agroforestry planning and design.






Agroforestry Academy – Project Outputs


- Updated agroforestry training curricula including release and distribution of the updated 2013 Agroforestry Training Manual.
- 2. One Agroforestry Academy per year, over two years.
- 3. A total of 50 professionals trained from different agencies across 5 states, 25 per year.
- 4. Online learning community network for academy participants and graduates.
 - a) Recorded workshops will be made available online.
 - b) Online directory of agroforestry professionals and practitioners.
 - c) Regional inventory of on-the-ground applications of agroforestry practices. STILL TO DO!





Agroforestry Academy – Project Outcomes

- 1. Greater partnering across agencies.
- 2. Broadened agroforestry knowledge base among resource professionals.
- 3. Increased support by professionals toward landowner adoption of agroforestry.
