## **2020 Agroforestry Academy**

## **Veteran Farmer Scholarship Application**

The MU Center for Agroforestry is offering a limited number of farmer scholarships to attend the 2020 Agroforestry Academy. Scholarships of varying amounts, reserved exclusively for U.S. military veteran farmers, are as follows:

- a) Base level scholarship covers 50% of the cost of Academy registration: \$350 value;
- b) Intermediate level scholarship covers 100% of the cost of Academy registration: \$700 value:
- c) Full scholarship covers the cost of Academy registration, lodging and food\*: \$1,000 value.

Scholarship recipients are expected to cover the cost of their travel expenses to and from the Agroforestry Academy. To be considered, please answer the questions below thoughtfully. Applications must be emailed to toddcs@missouri.edu by 5PM EST on Friday, May 29, 2020.

The Agroforestry Academy is an intensive training program that includes activities requiring participants to stand for up to 20 minutes, walk short and moderate distances, and sit in classroom chairs for periods of up to 1.5 hours. We recognize that not all individuals are comfortable or able to complete these tasks without assistance. During the Agroforestry Academy, participants will learn from agroforestry professionals and farmers about each of the recognized temperate agroforestry practices: windbreaks, riparian and upland forest buffers, silvopasture, forest farming, and alley cropping. Additionally, classroom sessions and field visits will cover economic and financial aspects of agroforestry decision-making, markets and marketing for perennial specialty crops, basic cultivation techniques for common perennial crops in agroforestry, infrastructure for agroforestry adoption, and a forest apiculture (beekeeping) workshop.

Hands-on and collaborative learning aspects of the Academy include: a group case study farm design project to apply what's been learned each day, hands-on mushroom inoculation and tree grafting demonstrations, and a silviculture (applied forest management) exercise to create forested silvopasture paddocks.
