3rd Agroforestry Academy Attracted Educators, Landowners, Military Veterans

The MU Center for Agroforestry hosted its' 3rd Agroforestry Academy from July 20-24, 2015 in Columbia, Missouri. Twenty four trainees from ten states across the

US and Canada spent a very full week learning about agroforestry both on campus and while visiting seven different outlying farms. While previous Agroforestry Academies focused "training the trainer" with natural education resource professionals, the 3rd Academy was organized to engage a greater number of farmer-landowners.

In particular, there was a special emphasis on providing agroforestry training to US military veteran farmers. Nine military veteran farmers received scholarships from UMCA through a USDA Beginning Farmer and Rancher Development Program "Armed-to-Farm" grant subaward from the University of Arkansas. Sixty percent of the 2015 academy trainees were farmers/landowners.

In addition to a stop at the MU Horticulture and Agroforestry Research Center, six different landowners were visited during the Academy showcasing an array

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presentations to the case study farm landowner at the close of the week.

A post-academy evaluation revealed that 96% of trainees rated the academy as excellent or good.

Trainees ranged in age from ~25 to 65. One trainee commented "I loved it! It was very well organized and the visits gave everyone a chance to see agroforestry practices in place." The 4th Agroforestry Academy will held from July 25-29, 2016.
