

Agroforestry Academy Offers Intensive, Integrated Training Opportunity for Diverse Learners

Since 2013, the University of Missouri Center for Agroforestry (UMCA) has been delivering a one-week intensive training program for service providers and farmer-landowners to glean a comprehensive understanding about the science and practice of integrating trees and shrubs on farms with crops, livestock, and wildlife. As the 2019 Agroforestry Academy approaches, a reflection of the program reveals continuous adaptation to the interests, needs,

and learning styles of diverse participants, guided by the feedback provided by participants in pre- and post-Academy surveys. There are now three main components of the Academy: farm visits, classroom seminars, and a case study design project. Each component offers unique and complementary ways for participants to engage with agroforestry content.

Farm visits generally rank among the most valuable aspect of the Academy. During these morning field experiences, when the summer sun has yet to elevate daytime temperatures, participants have an opportunity to meet innov-

ative farmer-landowners, to be inspired by their successes, and to ask questions about all aspects of their implementation, management, and marketing decisions. In addition to working agroforestry farms, the group also visits the MU Horticulture and Agroforestry Research Center (HARC) to learn about a plethora of ongoing research projects, and to gain hands-on skills such as grafting and mushroom inoculation from HARC research technicians and UMCA staff.

In the hot afternoons, air conditioned classroom seminars connect participants with agroforestry professionals from UMCA, the USDA National Agroforestry Center, the Savanna Institute and other partnering organizations to share detailed information about specific practices and techniques. The annually updated Agroforestry Training Manual and Handbook for Planning & Design are provided to participants as text resources that complement seminar content.

At the outset of the week, attendees are provided with information about a case study farmer's circumstances, their objectives, and a basic site description. Small groups are guided to work through the Handbook for Agroforestry Planning & Design during daily group meeting times in order to practice the important process of carefully considering each aspect of the design. Early in the week, a visit to the case study farm offers a chance for trainees to learn more about the site and the landowners' goals so that throughout the week, new content knowledge can be applied to this planning and design process. On the final day of the Academy, case study groups present their design plans to the farmer as a summative assessment of their understanding.

Registration is open for the 2019 Agroforestry Academy (July 21-26). Scholarships are available for US veterans.
